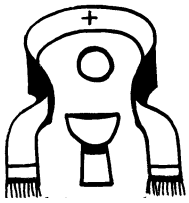

Hello New Family!

I know that Benno has already announced that I will be coming to Epiphany, but I want to personally introduce myself. It was a cold grey day in New York City last week, but I felt a definite warming trend when Benno, on the other end of the phone, asked me to be his new assistant priest. I am thrilled to be called to be among you and I look forward to a rich ministry at Epiphany.



So here is a snapshot: I received the M.Div. from Emory University, Candler School of Theology a year ago, with certificates in Christian Education and Women in Theology and Ministry. I am now completing a

Diploma in Anglican Studies at General Seminary in New York and will graduate in May. I was ordained to the diaconate in December of 2006. My home parish is the Church of the Good Shepherd in Covington, Georgia. I am interested in pastoral care, faith formation and how we integrate faith with social action, inter-religious dialogue, and the contemporary issues of our faith.

I own a small organic farm, Hazelbrand Farm, outside of Covington. Over the past fifteen years my partner, Margaret Putnam, and I have grown up to 100 varieties of vegetables and herbs and sold them in farmers markets and to Atlanta chefs. For years I have acted as an advocate for small farmers. Part of that work led me to start Morningside Market and other markets and mentor others to develop cottage industries.

My pleasures and pastimes include hiking and backpacking, gardening, knitting, and baking biscuits with my son. My personal spiritual practices include Centering Prayer, singing and chanting, lectio divina, yoga and qigong and frequent visits to monasteries—and hiking and gardening and baking biscuits with my son!

My son, Andrew, is almost 24. He graduated from Warren Wilson College with majors in historic preservation and archeology; now he lives in midtown Atlanta and works as a stonemason. Margaret is an artist and herbalist. She raises and rides horses, runs the

farm, makes our handmade soap and creates beautiful sacred spaces in the woods and by the river. We build, maybe a better word is mow a labyrinth each spring in the fresh rye grass, and two years ago I turned the milking parlor into a tiny meditation and prayer hut, La Casita de la Leche. We offer Quiet Days and meditative retreats on and off the farm. But with my time in seminary and living in New York for a year, our gardens, including our community garden, are in remission; currently most of our growing areas have given over to wild plants and herbs. In fact we love this wildness, and we gather the wild plants to add to our handmade soaps for their intense healing properties. We hope to get the gardens going again soon.

Meanwhile, I write. I specialize in food, ecology and organics (gardening and farming), along with the habits and skills of simple and sacramental living. I have written ten cookbooks and have written for dozens of magazines and newspapers over the years, including the Atlanta Journal Constitution since 1989. My most famous claim to fame is the food styling for the movie *Fried Green Tomatoes*. More recently my heart has been fed by work more meditative and spiritual. I enjoy sermon preparation, and I write occasionally for the Merton Annual, dedicated to the monk Thomas Merton. With seminary studies behind me I look forward to much more of this.

But I have run on too long—it's always dangerous to ask a writer for a "short bio." After graduation I will be making my way back to Atlanta, and after a rest (and some time on the Appalachian Trail—anyone want to walk with me?), I plan to start my new life with you. I look forward to getting to know each one of you and the blessing that you are.

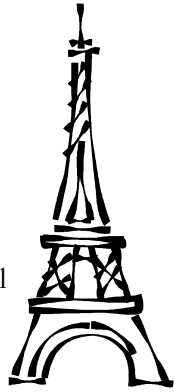

Vacations Far from the City

The west is a vast and varied region that is eye-popping to those from here when they first cross the Rockies. If you have never experienced clear dry air, star burst nights, Swiss like mountains out the door, a hot springs swimming pool, along with charming Victorian houses, restaurants, a fine bookstore, and art, antiques, and junk stores, OURAY, COLORADO is for you.

Every year when we offer our house for the Fling, people ask where in the world is Ouray and how do you pronounce it? U-ray was named after a Ute Indian spokesman. The town is not a Denver suburb, but in the southwest corner, many think the best part of Colorado. How do you get there—fly in and rent a car. Either to Montrose (35 miles away), Grand Junction (90 miles away), or Denver or Albuquerque for a day's drive and great things to do and see on the way.

The house, a former miner's cabin, now has two floors, 2 baths, 4 bedrooms, eat-in kitchen, living room, and deck (sleeps 6 people, at least 5 years old). When you are not deer spotting from the deck, you can hike, visit a railroad museum, an underground mine, drive to Mesa Verde, Telluride, and so on. If you need any further convincing talk to satisfied Epiphanyites—Timmers, Smith/Levins, Kathy Walmsley and Kathy Ryan, and Ted and Lissa Jackson. GET READY TO BID (minimum \$600 for a week).



Epiphany Greenspace



Sunday afternoons—those precious few Sabbath hours set aside to read the paper, take a nap, complete both the mega-evil Sudoku AND the Sunday *New York Times* crossword puzzle, take a walk in the park. At the end of the day, as you're gathering up the AJC automobile sections (after researching the best deal on your new hybrid) to put them into the recycling bin, consider the ways in which you can reuse those pages for next weekend's activities:

- **Keep weeds out of your garden.**
Layer three to four sheets of newspaper next to your plants (at least two inches away from the stems to prevent rotting). Water the entire area. Add a top layer of mulch, grass clippings or straw. The newspaper blocks sunlight—which weeds need to grow—and will help keep the soil moist.
- **Quell the smell.**
Line the vegetable drawer of your refrigerator to keep it smelling fresh, or put newspaper in your shoes to absorb moisture.
- **Ripen tomatoes.**
Wrap green tomatoes individually in a couple of sheets of newspaper. Store in an airtight container in a dark place at room temperature. Check them every three to four days.
- **Wash your windows.**
Mix a solution of equal parts water and white vinegar. Separate the newspaper into pages (avoid those with color pictures or ads). Crumple each sheet into a ball, soak it in the solution, squeeze out the excess, and rub windows in a circular motion. For extra shine, wipe the window with a clean sheet of newspaper.
- **Fix a flat tire.**
If you get a tear in your bike tire while riding, fold a quarter page of newspaper into a square big enough (and thick enough) to cover the hole. Slip the paper between tube and tire. Inflate the tube enough to hold the paper in place, then put the tire back on its rim and inflate the tube fully. This quick fix should keep you going for several miles.

Honor spends as much time as possible in the woods of southern Appalachia—on the banks of the wild and scenic Chattooga River, at the local lakes, and along the nearby Bartram Trail—collecting her thoughts along with weathered objects, images and ideas for her artwork. She has recently been particularly drawn to edges and places where different bodies and spaces come together converge—what light does when it moves over or across or through and what happens in the shadows where light falls past a space. Honor is inspired by the recognition in nature of those elements she connects to on a soul level, and translates that inspiration into jewelry and art.

A native of Georgia who grew up in Druid Hills, Honor has also enjoyed living in St. Louis, Brooklyn, Glasgow, London, and Allentown, but most of all, she loves the mountains of northeast Georgia, where she spent her childhood summers. A former member of Epiphany, Honor earned her BFA in Fine Art Photography at Washington University in St. Louis, and she also studied photography at the Glasgow School of Art in Scotland. She currently lives and works in her 200-year-old log cabin and studio, which sits in a quiet hollow in Lakemont, Georgia.
