It was a short visit, and I introduced him to some other friends and the city of Charleston. It was a wonderful trip, too short, and my parents were on their best behavior—I mean, I was on my best behavior. Most of our time was spent listening to stories from the past. I knew which cue words to throw out to get my mother telling a certain story, or a key word for one of my father's jokes (which I worked to keep at a minimum).

During our visit my mother was hospitalized for a minor viral infection something, and on our way out of town we made a good-by visit to her room. She was in pain, but in good spirits. Morten left us alone to talk while he ran off to retrieve his camera. And while he was gone, I leaned in to Mom and asked her, as if to a college buddy, "So what'ya think? Did I do o.k.?" I will forever remember her reaction.

Now, my mom was a good Christian woman, and it was a long process for her to accept the fact that perhaps God is o.k. with my life as an Episcopalian—just kidding, no problem there—actually, my life as someone who would partner with another man. My mother looked me in the eyes and said, "Well, you know, all these years I prayed that God would send you the right person." pause. "But when I prayed I never told God that it should be a woman and not a man. I guess He knows what he's doing."

What else can I say? Parents, talk to your children. Children, ask good questions, and all of us, cherish the moments we are given with our loved ones.

## Atlanta Episcopalians To Take Part In Martyrs Of Alabama Pilgrimage

The Diocese of Atlanta will be represented Aug. 11 at the ninth annual Jonathan Myrick Daniels and Martyrs of Alabama Pilgrimage, honoring Daniels and others who lost their lives during the civil rights movement, in Hayneville, Ala.

Bus transportation from Atlanta to Hayneville will be available for \$10 per person. The bus departs at 8:15 a.m. Saturday, Aug. 11, from the Cathedral of St. Philip and will return there at about 6 p.m. "Here Am I, Send Me: the Journey of Jonathan Daniels," a video narrated by Sam Waterston, will be shown during the nearly three-hour one-way trip.

## Epiphany To Build Habitat House With Interfaith Atlanta

The Outreach Committee is excited to announce that we will be building a Habitat House with Interfaith Atlanta, a diverse group of faith communities seeking to learn more about each other while doing good work in the world around us. A wonderful mixture of communities will be working and sharing with us, including Temple Sinai, Central Presbyterian, Unitarian Universalist Congregation, Shrine of The Immaculate Conception, Buckhead Christian Fellowship, The Ismaeli Muslim Community, The Atlanta Masjid of AL-Islam, Dor Tamid, and First Presbyterian Church. During successive breakfast and lunch breaks, a participating community will provide education on their faith tradition to the other participants.

The work will occur for seven weeks beginning on October 14 and ending on December 2. Each Sunday for the seven-week period, Epiphany will have a team working on the house. While trying to maintain some continuity, we will strive to involve as many members as possible. During the seven-week period, we will also be coordinating teams to work on Saturdays at the Habitat for Humanity warehouse building prefabricated portions of homes. To work on construction a person must be at least 16 years old. However, we are planning to involve the youth of the parish in preparing meals for the workers and helping with fundraising.

We invite your participation, and we will be posting a sign-up sheet. If you would like to make a donation, simply write "Habitat House" on the "re" line of your check so we will know its purpose.

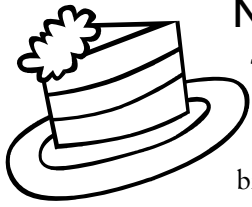

## Our Carbon Footprint

I am writing this in response to recent conversations about "carbon footprints." This is to tell you how Bob and I have lived most of our almost 62 years of marriage. My mother and father immigrated from Germany in 1925 and brought me along as a year-old child, so I grew up in a frugal German household. My father taught us not to waste water or electrical power.

These are some of the ways Bob and I have tried to accomplish this. We use screw in fluorescent light bulbs and turn them off when we leave the room. Bob saves our air conditioner water to water our outside plants and shrubs. We have a vegetable garden and have lettuce almost year round except in hot weather. At 86 years of age, Bob still grows tomatoes, peppers, cucumbers, and squash, which he starts from seeds in late winter. He also grows flowers this way. I do not let the water run continually while I brush my teeth. Plastic bags are used for our garbage and I also line our waste baskets with them. I wash out plastic storage bags for reuse, and I use foil more than once. My children call me "the bag queen." When we wash our lettuce from the garden I save the water for our house plants. We drive cars that are economical on gas. In fact we have an '81 Civic station wagon (considered an antique like us!) straight shift to run errands. It gets 40 miles to the gallon. We recycle our newspapers, glass and aluminum cans. We have a compost pile in the back of our lot in which we put all of our vegetable peelings, coffee grounds, egg shells, leaves and some paper. Bob uses this compost as our organic additive when he plants. Our house is shaded by trees and large shrubbery, which reduces air conditioning consumption. There are just some of the ways we try to save our environment and have done so for many years.



## Share A Road - Share Your Road To Church

Do you want to bike to church? It is a great way to lower our carbon footprint and enjoy a quieter, low-tech, and healthier way to get to Epiphany. Sundays are low traffic, and if East Lake Road itself is heavily traveled by parishioners pouring into our parking lot, I'm sure they are all eager to give cyclists lots of room. I am happy to coach anyone on choosing a route, depending on where you live.

I ride in from Oakhurst, Mead Road to be exact. I swing southward to Leyden Street and take it to Third Avenue, then to East Lake. Under the tracks and the rest of the trip is a piece of cake. If you can get to East Lake northbound from your home, you are fine. Even Howard Ave/DeKalb Ave isn't that bad, and Paden Circle and Ridgecrest are great streets to access East Lake.

Going home, I cut off on Ridgecrest to DeKalb Ave/Howard Ave (one of those street continues but suddenly the name has changed). There is a BICYCLE PATH along this stretch, inbound. Be very careful to cross the rail road tracks at an exact right angle or your front tire is sure to catch in the groove. The resulting crash can hurt you, and even bend your front wheel out of shape. Once on the by-path, I head either straight to the library, where I work on Sunday afternoons, or to the Post Office, via Adair Street and then on to Water and West Trinity etc. After work, it is home via Church Street (narrow, take the lane—meaning ride out from the curb far enough so that motorists will not try to pass you. Church Street goes directly to the by-path, and I cross to College Ave at the Atlanta Ave light, then left onto Mead Road. Home again and Tiki, my calico cat, tells me about her day as I pull up into the driveway.

Always wear a helmet. Always carry identification (my backup ID is an address label inside my helmet). I have never needed it, but Marjorie Timmer needed hers once last year. Have a full water bottle. Mostly, enjoy the trip. Mother Earth thanks you.

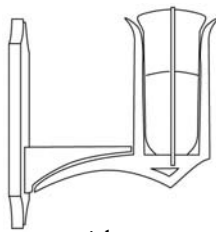

## Altar Flowers or Sanctuary Light Donations

As I grow older, I appreciate my parents more and more. They raised six children and sent each of us into the world with a strong educational framework, basic moral values, and a healthy dose of love. At times, as significant dates or events trigger memories, it becomes important for me to honor my parents once again.

Do you have someone in your life whose memory makes you happy or proud? Maybe you're just grateful for having known that person. Are there people whose lives still touch you in positive ways whom you want to thank visibly? Maybe being a member of a group, such as one of the choirs or EFM, enriches your life over and over. There are many ways you can honor those people whom you hold important. Two are quite simple. Consider making an offering for altar flowers or the sanctuary light for a week. The altar flowers add natural beauty and remind us of life, growth, and the changing seasons. Its flame is steady, day and night, regardless of our own fragile emotional conditions.

Providing for either is a fitting honor and allows us to express our appreciation for others in a tangible way. The process is simple. Sign-up sheets are in the Crossing Hall. Complete the information for your chosen date or dates. Then drop a check into the offering plate. Be sure to indicate the purpose of the donation, e.g., altar flowers—July 24. A donation of \$45 is suggested for altar flowers and \$6 for the sanctuary light.

Mark your calendars and get ready for our annual parish retreat at Kanuga. This year, our weekend is Friday, October 26, through Sunday, October 28. Kanuga is an Episcopal Retreat center. ## What's Happening in Deepdene?

"What's Happening in Deepdene?" is the subject of a public meeting sponsored by the Olmsted Linear Park Alliance (OLPA) on Thursday, September 6, at 7:30 p.m. in the Epiphany parish hall. Spencer Tunnell, the landscape architect responsible for planning the restoration of the 50-acre linear park according to Frederick Law Olmsted's original design, will make a presentation and answer questions. In 2008 OLPA hopes to complete its capital campaign (including a long-term maintenance fund) and finish work in Deepdene, the 22-acre segment that lies across Ponce de Leon from Epiphany. Members of the parish have a special invitation to attend the meeting.
