## Ordination Remembrances:

To the Guilds, *salude!* To the musicians, *salude!* To the cooks, *salude!* To the people of Epiphany, *salude!* To Benno, *salude!* To all of you who made this night possible and made it so magnificently beautiful, I offer to you my grateful thanksgiving.

The theme of the Holy Spirit and the passion, creativity and exuberance of high summer shone in the reds, yellows and oranges that filled the church and parish hall. It flowed from the flower arrangements formed from the flowers and vegetables of July to the ribboned garlands worn by the musicians, to a bowl of water with floating flower petals at the entrance to the nave, to the red stoles worn by attending clergy, to the culmination of the vesting of the new priests in red.

As the processional began, I stood with Benno and presenters at the far side, at the back of the church. I heard the drum and the recorder start, and as we sang "I bind unto myself today...." through the people I could see the clergy procession—red stoles and bodies gliding forward to the music of this song that will set the tone for my ministry at Epiphany. Red was everywhere.

Spirit was everywhere. As I kneeled before the Bishop, flanked by clergy, their hands on me, the church chanting *Veni Creator Spiritus*, I experienced the profound power of a community of people at prayer. I felt lifted and set in place as a priest through the chanting of the people. I was filled with joy and a sense of fulfillment—a rightness but also a sacred obligation.

The ceremony ended with vesting. I remember it as two huge red flutterings above Maricclair's and my head. So quickly the Bishop offered the stole for me to kiss, then he placed it around my neck. The next thing I knew, Benno was lifting the chasuble, the red of it, the silk and brocade of it, the bigness of it, up, up, into the air and over my head. It was a giant red cloud, a flower unfolding, the Passion of Christ, a flurry and flapping of red geese heading into the wind over my head.

Down it came over me, shrouding me, covering me, much like the *lorica* or breastplate prayer St. Patrick prayed as he dressed himself in the armor of Christ. Maricclair's vester was also vesting her at the same time. In my mind's eye I can see the two giant red chasubles being lifted high above our heads, kites taking to the wind. Passion, love, longing, creativity and God's exuberance flowed from the chasubles and onto us, two new priests in Christ's church.

The truth is, I did not choose the theme of reds and yellows and oranges only because of the passion and creativity and exuberance of high summer. I think in fact that they chose me, because they seem to flow naturally out of Epiphany. Here, love is everywhere.

The pageantry is over, the champagne and ham sandwiches and deviled eggs and brownies a delicious memory. Now a new tone emerges from the exuberant red of ordination; that of green. My budding ministry and my servant leadership begin under the expert guidance of Benno and all of you. *Salude* again!

## Reduce Your Carbon Footprint

It's time to start that diet—low carbon diet, that is. Please come share a breakfast of organic and/or locally-grown foods after the 8:30 a.m. service on July 22 as Epiphany launches a three-month campaign to reduce the amount of carbon each of us contributes to Mother Earth.

Our carbon calculator is based on just three months of activity. You can start your carbon footprint reduction on July 22 and see how much progress you've made by October 22. Or, you can go back to July 22, 2006, and compare your carbon footprint reduction each month with what you produced a year ago. Keep track of everything you do, and on Sunday, October 28, we'll compare notes and share stories of what we did to cut back. Epiphany will also have an environmentally-friendly thank you gift to reward everyone for their efforts.



The purpose is to get as many of you as possible to reduce the number of miles you drive and the amount of gallons of gasoline you use, to reduce the amount of natural gas and electricity you use in your homes, and to start recycling or increase what you're already doing.

Forms for the Atlanta Area Carbon Calculator will be in the Gallery on July 22. Tips to help you shrink your carbon footprint are on the back. Meanwhile, the Epiphany Star will continue to provide conservation tips in the green corner.

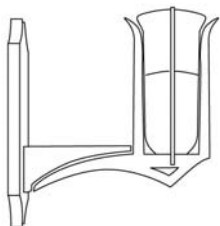
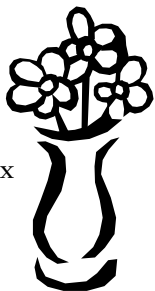

reserve sacrament, reminds us of Christ's continual presence in the world. Its flame is steady, day and night, regardless of our own fragile emotional conditions.

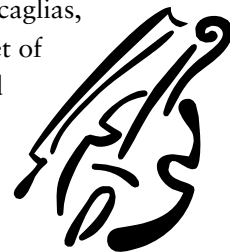

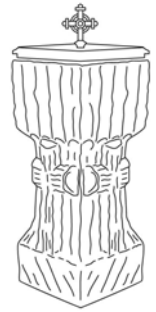

## EFM—Education for (Lay) Ministry

If you are interested in exploring topics of theology, the Bible, church history, and traditions, you might be interested in signing up for the EFM group at Epiphany that will resume meeting weekly in late August or early September.

Education for Ministry (EFM) is a four-year program of theological distance education for lay people offered through the School of Theology at University of the South in Sewanee, Tennessee. This program combines theological reflection, small group interaction, and Bible study, providing a grounding for exploring lay ministry.

The classes serve to continue the education of the laity while allowing individuals to share and reflect on their life journey in relationship to the topics shared. A major goal of the program is to help each person explore, clarify, and develop her or his lay ministry. Participants learn to “think theologically” as dialogue reveals insights and ideas. Readings take approximately 2-3 hours weekly.

The class will meet at Epiphany on Tuesday or Wednesday evenings from 6:30-9 p.m. from late August/early September through May. Tuition is approximately \$340 per year. A person may join EFM at Year One or continue study from a previous EFM group. Registration is due by July 25.

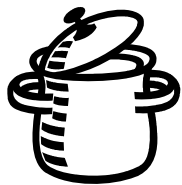

## ERD Responds To Flooding In Pakistan

Episcopal Relief and Development (ERD) is providing emergency aid to people in Southern Pakistan after flooding caused severe damage in the region.

Heavy rains caused flooding in Karachi, the largest city in Pakistan, in the Sindh Province, and in surrounding areas. Over 300 people have died from storm-related damage and flooding. Many areas of Karachi are without electricity and basic amenities, and there is concern about the development of water-borne diseases due to slow cleanup efforts. In the Balochistan province, 200 people are missing and two million people in 15 districts were affected by flooding.

Gadap, the city worst affected by flooding, is located 34 miles outside of Karachi. Over 24 people were killed, over 200 others were injured, and one thousand homes were heavily damaged or completely ruined. The destruction was caused by 69 mile per-hour wind gusts followed by torrential rain that caused many of the homes and buildings in less developed areas to collapse. Residents are now dependent on contaminated water after the covers of the town's concrete water tanks were blown away. The floods killed livestock and destroyed 75 poultry farms. So far, the storms have caused damage estimated at 200 million rupees, close to \$3.5 million U.S.

ERD is working in partnership with Church World Service to provide emergency relief to 250 vulnerable families in Gadap. Critical food supplies such as wheat flour, rice, cooking oil, sugar, tea leaves, iodized salt, powdered milk, and matches will be distributed to each family, particularly those most vulnerable such as widows, children, and the elderly.
