We cooked, well Laura did mostly, except for breakfasts, I do that part, we lounged, we read, we rode in the boat, we sang the Phos Hilarion at cocktail hour. I made the kids go out with me several times at unsuccessful attempts to hook a bass. We played games, watched a movie, went to town, had ice cream, visited the local Episcopal church where the priest (someone I know) thought I was a bum at the door when I knocked, and we took a long walk in the in sun.

The walk was the best part; mostly because I was with my family and had nothing to do and nowhere to go. I like that sometimes, just being outside together. I liked it too, because it was a very perfect day, just warm enough. We all climbed rocks and laughed as Emma and I nearly fell on top of each other. Then my 17 year old picked me up. He actually picked me up. Well, I kind of facilitated because I jumped on his back but he carried me. We have pictures. It was a remarkable role reversal. I've been carrying my kid for 17 years. It was a moment in the sun.

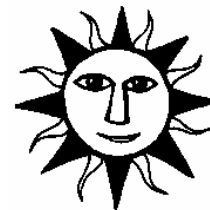

## The Agápe Supper

April 5 at 6:15 p.m.

Epiphany has a wonderful Agápe Supper and Maundy Thursday Liturgy that begins at 6:15 p.m. This meal and liturgy commemorates the meal that Jesus celebrated with his disciples. The Agápe Supper and Liturgy includes a meal, a foot washing, an informal Eucharist and the solemn stripping of the altar in the nave.



No recipes have come down to us from the time of Christ. Knowing what raw materials were available to the Jews of Palestine in that period and what foods and dishes were mentioned in the Bible, we have an idea of what Christians may have eaten at an Agapé (love) feast. Dried and fresh fruits (no citrus as oranges and lemons were rare and very expensive), olives, almonds, different kinds of cheeses, lentils, cucumbers with yogurt, couscous, tabbouleh, hummus and bread could have been a part of these meals. For the bread, flatbread, pita, or matzoth (or all three) might have been present. Wine for the adults (and grape juice for the children at our supper) would be the custom.

Sign up sheets are in the Crossing Hall. Your food offering is designated on the sign up sheet. Joel Fowler will once again be preparing the fabulous fish. The nursery will be available for infants and toddlers, if parents wish to use it. Older children are seated with their families.

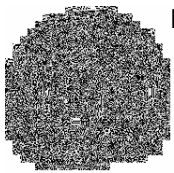
## Sunday Morning Adult Education Classes:

## East Atlanta Churches Celebrate Diocesan Centennial with March 25 Worship

Convocation will gather to celebrate the Diocesan Centennial at 4 p.m. Sunday, March 25, at Holy Trinity Parish, 515 E. Ponce de Leon, Decatur.

The event is a Service of Lenten Lessons and Carols with Holy Eucharist, and all are invited. The service will include readings from Holy Scripture, Lenten hymns and Lenten carols, which will be sung by a combined choir of the six parishes in the convocation. Have you heard about the ING Georgia Marathon? Well it's a new Atlanta sporting event that is going to pass right by our front door on Sunday, March 25, 2007.

Approximately 15,000 runners, walkers and wheelchair athletes are expected to participate in the 26.2 run through Atlanta's most historic neighborhoods, including ours.

## Holy Baptism

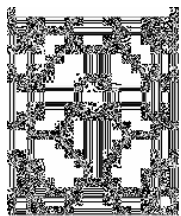
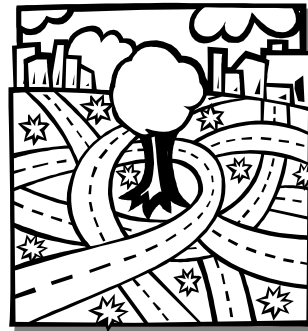

The mandatory baptism seminar for both services will take place on Saturday, April 7 at 10 a.m. If you or a member of your family desires to be baptized, please contact the parish office.

## Epiphany GreenSpace

Okay, so you have to drive your car.

Watching how you drive can improve your car's mileage per gallon, cutting global warming pollution and saving you anywhere from \$200 to \$500 each year.

- Travel light and pack smart. Extra weight decreases fuel economy. Hauling an extra 100 pounds in your vehicle reduces fuel economy by up to 2 percent. Place luggage inside rather than on the roof or trunk to minimize drag and increase mileage.
- Drive less aggressively. Aggressive driving—rapid acceleration and braking—can lower gas mileage by as much as 33 percent on the highway and 5 percent in town. Aggressive drivers are using an extra 125 gallons of gas and spending over \$250 more than average drivers each year.
- Slow down. In highway travel, exceeding the speed limit by a mere 5 mph results in an average fuel economy loss of 6 percent.
- Know when to use the air. Air conditioning can decrease your fuel efficiency by as much as 12 percent in stop-and-go traffic, so consider cracking the windows. But at high speeds, driving with the windows open can decrease the overall efficiency of the vehicle.
- Don't idle. If you are stopping for more than ten seconds—except in traffic—turn off your engine. Idling for more than ten seconds uses more gas and creates more global warming pollution than simply restarting your engine.



## The Ministry of the Usher

The ministry of the usher is one of hospitality, and it has been part of the Judeo-Christian tradition for centuries. “Keepers of the Threshold” staffed the entrance to the Jewish temple, according to the Old Testament. In the early Christian centuries, doorkeepers or porters served the church in Rome and Syria.

In ancient times, when the faithful formed small minorities in the midst of a pagan population not well disposed toward Christianity, it was of the utmost importance that such offices should be entrusted to thoroughly reliable men. For this reason special orders were introduced by the Church, and men were ordained by a sacred rite for the worthy discharge of these offices. At what time this was done cannot be established with certainty. But we know that Pope Cornelius, in a letter written to Fabian, Bishop of Antioch, about the year 251, mentions that four minor orders as we have them today. He writes that in the Church of Rome were at the time 46 priests, 7 deacons, 7 sub-deacons, 42 acolytes, 52 exorcists, lectors, and porters.

In the Catholic Church, the minor order of porter, or ostiarate, was conferred on all those seeking ordination to the priesthood until Pope Paul VI eliminated all the minor orders in 1972. Today, the ministry is usually carried out in parishes by laymen who assist parish worship by welcoming people, helping them find seats, taking up the collection and passing out parish bulletins. The usher is often the first person whom worshippers meet when they enter church. The usher has the opportunity and responsibility to represent the rest of the assembly.

Although the church is from the days when it was necessary to keep watch for persecutors, the ancient order of the porter is now performed at Epiphany with Ushers and Greeters. Hospitality plays a vital role in creating a sense of community for worship. A person who feels welcomed feels valued and is more likely to wholeheartedly enter into the liturgical celebration.

On Trinity Sunday, June 3, Epiphany will join in the recognition and celebration of the Ushers and Greeters that serve as ministers of hospitality. Watch for more information in an upcoming Epiphany Star.

While we will continue to use the prayer forms in the BCP, we would like to offer frequently prayers that we draft ourselves. We know the Holy Spirit will use our imaginations and talents to voice our collective prayers in wonderful new ways. 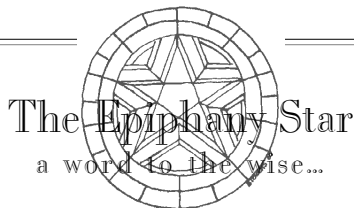
