## St. Mathias

We all know him. Right? Our favorite. So beloved of God. Best man for the job. Who else but Mathias?? Could anyone else have done what he did? Everyone's favorite Saint, Mathias. Thank God for Mathias. Okay okay. Who is Mathias anyway?

Here is the story. His feast day is February 25<sup>th</sup>. I will give it to you straight from the Acts of those glorious Apostles. First a little background. The former disciples, now known as apostles (funny how titles have always meant so much in the church) are wondering at their number. Since Judas' demise they have felt a little lopsided. One apostle short of an even dozen. So craving symmetry perhaps, they decide to elect another one of them and here is the tale, Peter is speaking:

*So one of the men who have accompanied us during all the time that the Lord Jesus went in and out among us, beginning from the baptism of John until the day when he was taken up from us—one of these must become a witness with us to his resurrection.” So they proposed two, Joseph called Barsabbas, who was also known as Justus, and Matthias. Then they prayed and said, “Lord, you know everyone’s heart. Show us which one of these two you have chosen to take the place in this ministry and apostleship from which Judas turned aside to go to his own place.” And they cast lots for them, and the lot fell on Matthias; and he was added to the eleven apostles.* Acts 1:23-26

They did what? They rolled the dice!! I don't think the church has done anything that cavalier and ridiculous in 2,000 years and for an apostle no less. The most revered job in the church. They threw the dice for crying out loud. Who was Mathias anyway?

A nobody. A someone. A beloved, faceless, almost forgotten child of God.

How many faceless, forgotten children of God die everyday without fulfilling any discernable purpose in heaven or on earth? We are all as dispensable as Mathias, or as the thousands that will die today forgotten. Yet.

Yet, the story goes that by some remarkable chance Mathias is chosen. Not forgotten. A witness to a mighty story about resurrection, holy imagination, passion, love, forgiveness, new life, a song about creation that begins before the dawn of time, all this is what Mathias is witness to, what we are witness to by virtue of our baptism, our standing around waiting to see if the lot will fall to us to tell our story in whatever forgotten, meek, hapless way we may tell it.

The irony is that it is a beautiful story. You have purpose. You are needed here at Epiphany to tell your story, to remind us that you are Mathias, I am Mathias: forgotten, faceless, almost by accident, but not quite, not really. Mathias is the way God works, in our hapless, chance filled lives. God is our good luck, our happy day, our roll of the dice where we are chosen every time. Where every one who will die today is chosen as a beloved child of God. Every time.

### Epiphany's Art Ministry Welcomes Mary Logan's Spiritually Inspired Assemblages For The Month Of March

Mary Calloway Logan is a found-object artist with orientation toward faith and spirituality themes. The exhibit at Epiphany includes many of her stunning stations of faith and other assemblages that speak to the new century including upheaval, terrorism and the global community.

Mary has served as a pastoral counselor for 33 years located at Druid Hills United Methodist Church and she attended Yale Divinity School. She is an ordained minister and a third generation pastor. She is married to Dr. Kent Logan, autism specialist for DeKalb County and has two adult daughters, Hillary and Hannah, both married.

She has shared her unique creative expression for seekers of prayer at Seeds of Light Studio and has taught a class designated *Creativity and Pedagogy* at Candler School of Theology. Through retreats for many types of groups, Mary teaches participants to focus on creativity and see in new ways. Materials include found objects (cast off things from our culture) thus redeeming items that have been considered trash or useless. The new assembly can become a unique incarnation of an individual's redemption.

Mary's vision will be shared with us on Wednesday, March night during our evening Lenten program so look for details to express your own spiritual journey.

### Epiphany's Art Ministry Welcomes Barbara Deconcini For Two Sunday Mornings- March 9 And March 16

Barbara DeConcini is the wife of long time parishioner Walt Lowe. She will display and sell her custom jewelry pieces on two Sunday mornings March 9 and March 16 only. In Barbara's own words:

"I really think I got my best visual education from my fine arts and design students during the fifteen years I spent as a professor at the Atlanta College of Art. While I was introducing them to literature and the history of ideas, they were teaching me how to see. The love of light, color, and design engendered in me then finds expression now in the jewelry I design and craft. My aim is to make pieces of casual elegance, working mostly in natural materials such as gemstones, crystals, metals, clay, and stone. I find the process itself not only relaxing but even contemplative. I love the poetry of Gerard Manley Hopkins, which celebrates the things of earth as expressions of grace. "There lives the dearest freshness deep down things." he writes; "it will flame out, like shining from shook foil." Working with these natural stones to fashion something of simple beauty, I often feel in deeper touch with that "dearest freshness."

## The Green Corner

This column is about the on-going environmental stewardship efforts of the ESC, otherwise known as the Environmental Stewardship Committee. We welcome all Epiphanites' input, concerns and thoughts regarding our mission.

One of our initiatives involves food. Our food supply has changed greatly in the past few decades, almost making "seasonal" a word of the past. Years ago, peaches were available only in summer, as we depended on a local supply. Now, we can easily get peaches (and other summer delights) in the middle of winter, frequently grown in Chile or other far flung countries. Recently, concerns have been raised about the wholesomeness of certain foods and the energy consumption of shipping these foods thousands of miles. No doubt, many of you have read newspaper articles regarding these issues.

ESC is interested in having Epiphany join a CSA group. CSA stands for "Community Sustained Agriculture". The basic idea of these organizations is several small, family owned farms will join together and offer "shares" to the community. The shares can be purchased for a growing season and the farms will deliver a quantity of fresh, local produce weekly during the growing season. The shares allow the farmers a steady income, and there may be a small fee for each delivery. The share-holders enjoy fresh, local produce and know they are helping family farms stay in business. Typically, the amount of food will feed a family unit of 4; a group of singles or 2 couples can buy a share together and split the food amongst themselves.

This is a very exciting effort for the committee. We hope you will share our enthusiasm for this initiative. As our group works out the details, we will inform the parish about our results.

## Outreach Committee Retreats to Plan for the Future

The members of the Outreach Committee and our rector Benno Pattison spent Saturday, February 16 in retreat to reflect on its work, plan for the future, and to craft its Mission Statement. This young committee (originating last June) has worked hard without pause so welcomed this chance for deeper reflection and bonding as a committee. Benno led the group in theological reflection on Mathew 25:31-46 (sheep and goats), our Baptismal Covenant, and Epiphany's Mission Statement to set the framework for us to establish our committee mission. Here is the Outreach Committee's Mission Statement: "Our radical values lead us to reach out to the people of Epiphany and inspire them to works of reconciliation so that the world knows it is the beloved."

As part of our role in overseeing current outreach ministries at Epiphany, those activities to which we give funds and/or volunteer time, we set up a schedule for review. Key people in and out of the parish will be invited to these meetings. Recently at our Appreciation Luncheon for Peachtree-Pine and Hagar's House, we heard from some of you. Anyone may give us written input/email about these ministries. The schedule is as follows for these reviews to be held at our monthly meetings at 6:30 in the Parish Hall: March 12, Hagar's House; April 9, DCM; May 14, DEAM; June 11, Peachtree Pine; July 9, Emmaus House and Holy Comforter; August 13, Habitat. Sherry Wallace will oversee reorganization of the Peachtree-Pine ministry.

Other sessions included: inspiring and developing vibrant committee life--you'll see and hear from us in various ways this year. Developing methodology and knowledge base for mission trips and global mission--Ann Fowler, our new Episcopal Relief and Development representative to the diocese, and Gretchen Maclachlan will attend various conferences to boost our capacity to inspire the parish to work for the least of among the world's people. Brent Henderson will liaison with the parish youth and inspire their service work. Kristen Jones will do this among the "20s & 30s" group. Bobbie Campbell will help us learn more about our companion diocese of Central Ecuador and their needs and provide guidance for our ministry assessment process. Bonnie Kissler will be our committee "techno geek" and survey instigator. Several members will be publicizing our committee efforts with Ann Fowler doing art work for new "products." Watch for them!

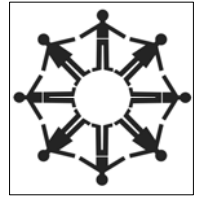
## Mikell Summer Camp Registration 2008

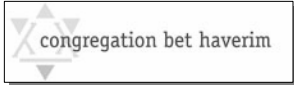
### Holy Baptism

# Hebrew Contemplative Chant

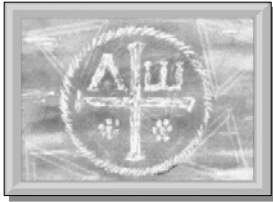
Sunday, March 9, 4:30 to 5:30 p.m.

chant, referencing the Hebrew Bible and Psalms from the Lectionary for these Sundays. The session will precede the Sunday 6 p.m. Eucharist, and will be a perfect way to ease into that contemplative service. You don't have to be a singer to love this prayer practice. ## Centering Prayer Workshop



Contemplative Outreach of Atlanta will offer a seven-session program on *Centering Prayer* at Epiphany. The program begins with the all-day workshop from 9:00 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. on Saturday March 8, and includes six weekly continuing sessions (dates and times for continuing sessions will be determined by workshop participants). The series will introduce participants to the four simple steps of *Centering Prayer* and provide opportunities to practice the discipline in daily life. Centering Prayer is a simple method of prayer, rooted in ancient Christian tradition.

Contemplative Outreach is a spiritual network of individuals and small faith communities committed to living the contemplative dimension of the Gospel in everyday life through the practice of Centering Prayer. The contemplative dimension of the Gospel manifests itself in an ever-deepening union with the living Christ and the practical caring for others that flows from that relationship. ## The Maundy Thursday Liturgy

Thursday, March 20 at 6:15 p.m.

Maundy Thursday begins with an Agape supper in the parish hall. We then do the liturgy of the word, make Eucharist around our tables, every table brings bread and wine, and wash feet, if you'd like at stations around the Parish Hall. We then process into the Church for the stripping of the altar and reservation of the blessed bread and wine, body and blood of Jesus. This meal and liturgy commemorates the meal that Jesus celebrated with his disciples.

No recipes have come down to us from the time of Christ. Knowing what raw materials were available to the Jews of Palestine in that period and what foods and dishes were mentioned in the Bible, we have an idea of what Christians may have eaten at an Agapé (love) feast. Dried and fresh fruits (no citrus as oranges and lemons were rare and very expensive), olives, almonds, different kinds of cheeses, lentils, cucumbers with yogurt, couscous, tabbouleh, hummus and bread could have been a part of these meals. For the bread, flatbread, pita, or matzoth (or all three) might have been present. Wine for the adults (and grape juice for the children at our supper) would be the custom.

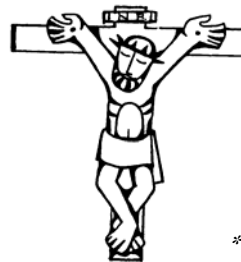
Sign up sheets are in the Crossing Hall. Your food offering is designated on the sign up sheet. The nursery will be available for infants and toddlers, if parents wish to use it. Older children are seated with their families and are encouraged to attend.

### Wait One Hour

Our traditional vigil Maundy Thursday night and Good Friday morning is an opportunity for people to come to the church in response to Jesus' question in the Garden of Gethsemane, "Could you not keep awake one hour?" A time for prayer, meditation and scripture reading, the vigil hours mark the time between the Last Supper and Jesus' crucifixion. Vigil keepers are invited to pray near the altar of repose, in the baptistry, where the reserved sacrament is kept during this time. Please sign up to watch with Christ one hour.
