War and the Soul

When I was probably 8 years old, my parents gave me a sign that read "STOP BOMBING BABIES", put me at the front of the line of about a dozen people and we marched off in protest of the war.

I grew up in the shadow of the Vietnam War. Watched movies about it growing up. Heard the stories of the people that new veterans coming home. Relished the paradoxical mythology of my Dad's activism; he helped pacifists across the border into Canada, while counseling returning veterans at the VA Hospital in Seattle, Washington. We rented a room to a Green Beret. I thought he was the coolest, nicest guy I had ever met.

Years later, I see them on the streets. The veterans. Lots of homeless guys in their 50's and 60's who hold placards, similar in size to the one I held as a child, this time saying, "Help, Vietnam vet, need food, work..." compassion, understanding, shared responsibility, mercy, relief.

As Ed Tick would have it, they need their soul back. I've just finished reading Ed Tick's book, *War and the Soul* where he describes the soul destroying nature of war, how it manifests as Post Traumatic Stress Disorder, how that disorder really is a disorder shared by our nation, not just the warriors who fought in our wars, but the society that created the wars, funded the wars, ignored our soldiers after the wars, taught us all how to dehumanize our enemies, and inflamed our mythic lust for war.

I've felt a vague sense of culpability for the wars we have fought for years. I've marched in peace rallies and voted against those who have wanted wars, and yet it is not enough. It is not enough to continue to consume the resources of the world, to go on with my life as if, when a war ends, or God forbid, while we are in the middle of one, I can just live a normal life. I've become aware, more so each day that I bear a responsibility. I've become aware that I have work to do with my brothers and sisters who have fought in our wars. I bear the responsibility to share the burden of war with our veterans and soldiers.

For me it is a uniquely Christian responsibility. It is the responsibility to help people, not just soldiers, but everyone involved, all of us, find our soul in what at times is a soul withering enterprise.

This September Ed Tick will be at Epiphany to talk with care givers and therapists, our community, our veterans, about restoring the soul. He contends that we must all engage in the work of restoring the soul, for our soldiers and for ourselves in the aftermath of war. He will be here on September 12th (for caregivers) and on September 13th (for the community and soldiers and their families) to talk about how we begin this terribly important work. Go to our website www.epiphany.org to find the details. I hope you will join me that weekend, take up the responsibility we all share, and begin the work of reconciliation.

Epiphany Art Ministry welcomes Marjorie Foster for July 2008

This show is titled *Yesterday*. *Yesterday* is a collection of narrative, nostalgic, autobiographic paintings by the artist of her early childhood during the days of the Depression. The paintings are rendered with the help of old photographs of the time when life was a lot simpler and a lot sparser.

Marjorie Foster, an oil painter, is pursuing a painting career with her interest in a colorful palette. Initially interested in still life painting in a scenic setting, she is now expanding her outlook to paint landscapes ranging in subject matter from trips to Europe as source material to more familiar venues in the states, implementing a “sgraffito” painterly style.

Born in Cleveland, Ohio, Marjorie studied Textile Design at the Cleveland Institute of Art, she then moved to Atlanta with her husband and started a family. Returning to work in Graphic Arts, she eventually moved into Textile Design. Along the way she returned to Georgia State University to earn her B.F.A. in Textile Design. She has studied portrait and figure painting with Roman and Constantine Chatov. Today she devotes her talents to painting exclusively in oils.

Marjorie is interested in finding a subject to paint that will permit experimentation and an exaggeration of color. She is interested in achieving an end result that will be an inspirational experience for the viewer with a pleasant and reflective result. She is incorporating the quote “The power of the suggestive is much greater than the statement of reality” as her theme in painting. Having been a child of the Depression and that followed by World War II, she feels the need to bring an uplifting aspect to the viewer.

Marjorie is a member of Art Station of Stone Mountain, Quinlan Visual Arts Center, Atlanta Artists Center, Kudzu Art Zone, and Dunwoody Fine Arts Association. The Atlanta Artists Center, the largest fine art organization in the Southeastern USA, awarded Marjorie their highest credential, “Member of Excellence.”

Her collectors are from many cities in Georgia, Irving, Texas, West Orange, New Jersey, Greer, S.C. Baton Rouge, La. and Key Largo, Fla. She is represented at Panoply, Newnan, Georgia and Fayette Art Center, Peachtree City, Ga.

It is best that we give all checks to the artist when they come to pick up their work as the check is not written for Epiphany’s percentage until all payments are complete. So, please help us with that. On your checks, please include the title and number of the art piece on your check as well. All paid-for items are left in the office at the end of the month and tagged with the purchaser’s name.

The Endowment Fund

As an additional opportunity for the parish's commitment to perpetual stewardship, the Vestry established THE ENDOWMENT FUND OF THE CHURCH OF THE EPIPHANY, INC. This Fund is intended to enhance the mission of the parish apart from the financial structure for general operations. No portion of income generated by the Fund shall be used for the annual operating budget. Assets are invested through the Episcopal Church Foundation in an Investment Management Services Account. The investment portfolio is allocated for reasonable total return while limiting risk and ensuring preservation of capital. The parish's Endowment Fund Board, chosen by the Vestry, administers the Fund in accordance with guidelines specified in the 2001 Plan of Operation.

Gifts of various types may be made to the Endowment Fund at any time:

- Cash
- Publicly traded securities
- Closely Held Securities
- Real Estate
- Life Insurance
- Tangible Personal Property
- Deferred gifts--e.g. gift annuities, charitable trusts, bequests



The Endowment Fund Board is charged with responsibility for a Gift Review Process whereby established guidelines for gift acceptance are followed. Prospective donors and outside advisors assisting in gift and estate planning may request from the Board a full description of the Gift Acceptance Policy of the parish.

While the Fund is designed to function as a true endowment with protection of the principal, there is a limiting formula for determining each year expendable funds which may be used for:

- Capital improvements, debt reduction, or the building program of the parish
- Scholarships or grants to members of the Church of the Epiphany
- Community outreach projects
- Special projects of the Episcopal Church

The Endowment Fund Board conducts an annual grants program to recommend to the Vestry appropriate disbursement of the limited funds made available through the Plan of Operation.

In recent years donors to the Endowment Fund have been recognized as members of the parish's Magi Foundation.

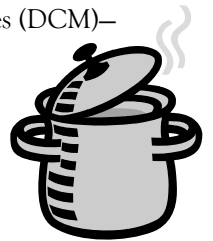

Also, please check off if this will be your first time volunteering at Hagar's House so that we can make sure that you are paired up with an experienced volunteer.

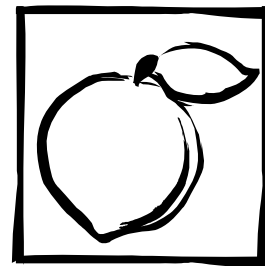


Poverty Rights Sandwiches
