Grammar

It is baptism seminar and someone brings up grammar. Ach. Grammar. Not my strong suite. But I went with it.

Oh, and we were talking about the Creed. Grammar and the creed!!! Exciting. Right? Grammar and the Creed.

So I said okay tell me about it. And they did. Here is the stunning observation.

God the father is present tense. ...*the creator*... God is creator. Creating, now. God is at work in this moment in the work of creation. Present tense.

Jesus is mostly past tense. He was conceived, was born, suffered, crucified, died, and on and on. Jesus, past tense.

The Holy Spirit is present tense. Right now tense. *the...catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins...*and on and on. It's about now. Right now, the Holy Spirit and all the stuff the Holy Spirit is doing is about us right now. That's it. The stunning grammatical revelation of the Creed!!

Can you believe it? The grammar of the Creed holds this incredible truth about the life of the church. The grammar of the Creed reveals a Pentecost moment.

For 21st century Christendom this is a stunning insight. I would argue that we, us Christians have been obsessed with Jesus for, well always. So much so that in the ivory tower of the academy one might argue that the quest for demythologizing and finding the historical Jesus, and the consequent scientific inquiry, and reductionism of biblical scholarship has utterly dominated theological inquiry in the 20th and into the 21st century. Its trickle down has been overwhelming to the pedestrian life of us ordinary Christians

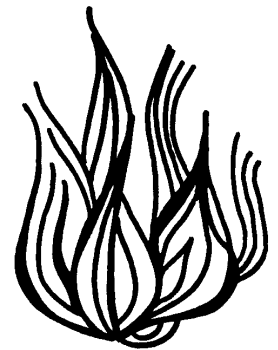
Consider, just for a moment the grammar of the Creed as the key that unlocks relationship with god. Then instead of trying to relate to your own or someone else's projections of the historical, past tense Jesus of 0-33 A.D. We can have a relationship with the present tense Holy Spirit alive in the church, the community of saints, and our ongoing and perpetual capacity to forgive each other and in the crazy claim in the face of death that we will live again.

How much more dynamic? How much more intense? How much more real and palpable, and just plain possible?

I don't want to do away with Jesus. On the contrary, it is as we usher in the dynamism of the spirit, how we might relate to God as Spirit that the historical Jesus might come alive in the wild rush of wind and the tongues of fire that dance around each one of us, every one of us who just might be a present christ fresh from a baptism in fire.

Our 11:15 a.m. service of Holy Eucharist will be held at Glenlake Park in Decatur on May 18.

The picnic meal price of \$4 for adults, \$2 for children, with a maximum of \$12 for a family is a bargain. Your payment includes a burger (beef or veggie), hotdog, bun, condiments, iced tea, and/or lemonade. We will be using eco-friendly plates and cutlery.

You can pick up a map showing the park's location when you register for the picnic.

Tips for joining in:

- Bring a chair, blanket, or sit-upon.
- Bring a side dish—cole slaw, green salads, fruit plates, potato salad, baked beans, chips, and desserts—cookies, brownies, for example. Remember a suitable serving utensil.
- Bring your softball, glove, bat. We have access to a field. Bring other outdoor toys—frisbees and the like.
- Try to carpool. Parking is limited, and, besides, we're the small carbon footprint parish.
- Remember to help with clean up.

Report of Endowment Board Grants

In accordance with the Plan of Operation of the Endowment Fund, the Board has recently made three grants. One grant went to Camp Mikell in support of its Partnership with Emmaus House. The grant provides funds for three Emmaus House children to attend Camp Mikell for one week this summer. A second grant provides funds for two members of our Outreach Committee—Gretchen MacLachlan and Ann Fowler—to attend the church-wide mission conference, Everyone, Everywhere 08, in Baltimore. Based on our level of support, The Church of the Epiphany will be listed as a Conference Sponsor. A third grant went to a student who needed some assistance with books and fees as she goes into her fourth year of undergraduate studies.

The limiting formula set forth in the Plan of Operation provided a maximum of \$3414 for grants this year. After review of the grant applications, the Board recommended to the Vestry allocation of only 72% of that total. The unused portion of the available funds will remain in the Fund for future use.

Epiphany Youth Visit Refugees

The day started off misty and gloomy. We had gotten up early, and our minds, like the weather, were foggy as we drove across North Georgia.

Four members of Epiphany's Journey to Adulthood class, along with two leaders, traveled to Jubilee Partners on Saturday, April 19 to meet the refugee family our church will soon welcome to the Atlanta area. Jubilee Partners is an intentional Christian community in Comer, GA, whose mission is to help refugees transition to American life.

All of us—Maggie, Sarah, Hilary, Lucy, Brandon and Carolyn—were welcomed and taken on a tour of the Jubilee Partners' houses, gardens, lake and pastures. After petting a young calf and admiring the baby goats, we ended up at the one-building school, where refugees take English classes and learn to live in America. There we met Eh Kaw Htoo, his wife Pa Saw Pah, and their children, five-year-old Jubilee Say and baby Jenny Say (a boy). They are Karen (Kah-REHN) Burmese refugees, who were persecuted in Burma and fled to refugee camps in Thailand. We left our new friends to share lunch with the volunteers and residents of Jubilee Partners. Over devotions and lunch, we learned about this community where the responsibilities are divided among all. We saw that they take turns cooking, doing dishes, and doing other chores. We got to meet many volunteers and permanent residents, and they all had very interesting life stories to tell.

After lunch, we went back to the area where the refugee families were staying, and met with several Karen and Burundian families. We played soccer and basketball with the little kids while their parents watched. We served the tea and chocolate chip cookies we had brought. Between cookies and basketball shots, we all had a wonderful chance to talk with Eh Kaw Htoo and Pa Saw Pah. Both speak good English. We were amazed by their resilience after twenty years in the refugee camps. They, in turn, were happy to feel that they already have friends waiting for them in Atlanta. We assured them that Epiphany will be ready for their arrival!

By the time the children's faces were covered in chocolate, we realized that both the sky and our minds had cleared. Warmed by the light of our friends' smiles, we gathered for a group photo and said our goodbyes. But we're looking forward to saying hello again when our new family moves to Atlanta!

St. David's Pilgrimage To Spain This Fall

El Camino De Santiago

The Camino de Santiago is an ancient Christian Pilgrimage route located in Northern Spain. The route was first walked by the Bishop of Le Puy, France in 961. For more than 1,000 years, Christians have traced the footsteps of Saint James (Santiago). Dr. Stan Beecham will lead a group of 12 pilgrims this fall (September 17 -October 2) and invites you to join him. This 16 day trip will consist of 12 days of walking the Camino, averaging 25 kilometers (15 miles) each day. The group will fly non-stop from Atlanta to Madrid. We will then travel by rail to Leon, where our pilgrimage begins. Twelve days and 200 miles later, the group will arrive in Santiago de Compostela. After spending a day in Santiago, we will fly back to Madrid for one day and then to Atlanta the following day. The cost of the trip is \$2,800 (includes: all travel, lodging, pre-trip preparation). As usual, there'll be a hospitality table in front of St. Luke's Church, where volunteers will be greeting the thousands of parade participants who pass by.

The weekend will be a great opportunity for evangelism, and we encourage your participation - staffing the booth or hospitality table, carrying a banner in the parade - at whatever level you feel comfortable. Look for more information soon in the parish hall.
