## Our Mission

Nourished by worship and witness, learning and teaching, fellowship and service, we strive to live out the Gospel's radical values with gladness of heart.



## Forgiveness

I received an early Christmas present this week, in fact, the only Christmas present I could ever want. My twenty-five-year-old son, Andrew, called me. He said "I really liked your sermon last week about forgiveness. Can I ask you some questions? I think I have forgiven someone, and then something pops up and I get mad all over again."

If any of you have twenty-five-year-old sons, you probably know that forgiveness is not at the top of fascinating topics. Processing emotions is not usually the reason they call home.

I gratefully proceeded to recap the themes of the sermon: to take ourselves lightly, take our egos lightly, ask God to help us forgive when we can't do it ourselves, that Jesus says we are forgiven AS we forgive, and that our typical false programs for happiness – pride, power, esteem – don't bring real happiness. It's looking for love in all the wrong places.

Calling on the ancient wisdom of the Toltec "Four Agreements," I suggested he not make assumptions and not take it personally: maybe the situation wasn't even about him; maybe it was a projection the other person was working out. Then we went a little deeper: We may not be victims, but co-creators. These situations might actually be gifts for us to look at more deeply at our role in the conflict. We talked about what could be called cheap grace—forgiving without apology and a contrite heart from the accused. We talked about the possibility of having a conversation with the person. This was all helpful, he said.

Finally we got around to the topics of humility and surrender. To surrender to a situation can be the highest form of forgiveness. Self-offering, or *kenosis* is what Jesus modeled in his life and on the cross. Theologian James Alison has written a book with a title that says it all: "*The Joy of Being Wrong*." But the silence on the other end of the telephone line told me that he needed something more. Something less theoretical, more practical.

He needed the Welcome Prayer.

This is a three-step process that uses Jesus' practice of self-offering. It allows us to physically and viscerally "put on the mind of Christ" and let God's forgiveness flow through us. Here are the steps:

First, since the emotion we hold in our bodies can be a major stumbling block (as well as poison), we must feel it in our bodies in order to move it out. Become aware that you are upset and explore how it feels. Are you getting tense? Knots in your stomach? Clenched jaw? A shield around your heart? Vertigo? Stay with the tension and emotion for a few seconds, or minutes or longer if necessary. Then, when you are ready, move in the opposite direction: consciously say—without judgment—"welcome anger" or "welcome fear." This counter-intuitive move softens and awakens our heart. It literally redirects neural pathways from the reactive reptilian brain that wants to strike back to the prefrontal lobes that tap into our ability to grow in compassion. It is cathartic and cleansing.

Finally, through the Holy Spirit, "letting go" happens. We don't have to make it happen. The sheer fact of acknowledging and accepting and being present to the emotion allows God to penetrate right to the heart of forgiveness. It can change us and change the world.

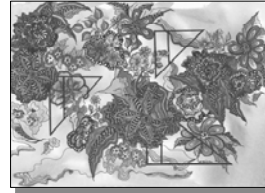
They will be accepting Styrofoam peanuts and packing blocks as well. For more complete details, you can access the city newsletter on-line.

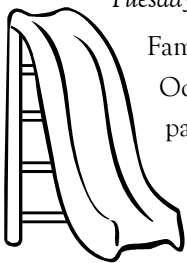

## D.E.A.M. Update

The Decatur-area Emergency Assistance Ministry (DEAM) helps families and individuals with financial assistance and food.

Since January, DEAM has helped:

- 1,718 families with food,
- 555 families with utility bills,
- 56 families with rent or mortgage payments,
- 36 individuals with prescription medication, and
- 98 individuals with other needs.

The pantry needs the following items at this time: thin spaghetti (1 lb. pkgs), spaghetti sauce, tuna, cereal, peanut butter and jelly.

We now have alternate-giving cards available to honor or remember friends or family while supporting the work of DEAM. They are located on the table in the gallery to the right of the narthex doors. 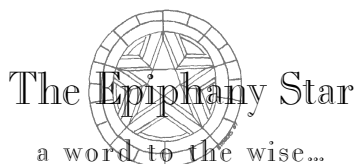
