Peachtree and Pine

Its down by Crawford Long Hospital, across the street, a big old hulk of a building on the corner of Peachtree and Pine Streets. The Task Force for the Homeless runs the program in that building. The perception is that anything, or rather anyone goes there. That is to say, the perception is that there is no rule about who can stay the night, or get fed at Peachtree Pine.

A perception also exists that the homeless men, they are mostly men, are bad for business, bad for the community there. It is also perceived that the leaders of that institution don't play nice. They don't negotiate, or make good neighbors. All of this mind you is perception, which is to say, there is probably some truth in it. Its also to say that those you read, or have heard talk about it have a vested interest in commerce, leases, propriety, and a sense of dignity that all colors perception.

I worked at St. Luke's (our mother parish) and heard a lot of these perceptions. St. Luke's has an interesting and difficult history with Peachtree Pine. Epiphany has a wholly different relationship to Peachtree Pine. So it not with out some experience of both sides of the equation of perspective that I offer this thought.

Regardless of your politics, or theology, of sense of social justice-one of the things that does happen, with out fail, is that the leadership of Peachtree Pine does manage to keep the issues of homelessness in front of us. By there very presence they remind us that the 'poor are always with us'. They will not, by virtue of there work, let the city of Atlanta forget that there are addicted, ravaged, mentally ill, desperate, marginalized, sad, happy, angry, poor men who live on the streets of Atlanta.

The most recent round of controversy over paying a water bill is a highly symbolic, prophetic voice that draws attention to the disaster of circumstance that can occur in the life of the marginalized that can land them on the street. The sterility of our government and our economic life are such that if you can't pay the bills, if you can't afford the necessities, if you can't make your way, on your own, you have no place in our society. There is no room for the marginalized, by definition they live out on the edge.

Lets be in conversation about these issues, these realities. Lets think and then do good work to be agents for the restoration of dignity to every human being. Lets keep proclaiming the good news to the poor. Lets keep praying for a place at the table for all God's people. Let's let our perspective be colored by the radiant face of God we just might see there on any given Friday as we prepare to feed the hungry. Lets listen to the voice that keeps urging us to break bread with outcasts and sinners. Lets keep serving Christ in all people.

Rector to preach on 'Day 1'

Our Rector will preach August 9 on "Day 1," a nationally broadcast radio program also accessible online at Day1.org. The program will feature a sermon by Benno along with interviews conducted by the program's host and executive producer, Peter Wallace.

Pattison was called by Epiphany in 2006 after serving for five years as associate rector of St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Atlanta. He is a graduate of the University of Georgia and of General Theological Seminary in New York, N.Y. Ordained a priest in 1988, Pattison then served three years at St. Augustine's Episcopal Church in Augusta, Ga., and five years as associate rector at All Saints' Episcopal Church in Atlanta.


Pattison's sermon, entitled "Out of the Depths," draws from Psalm 130. "Out of the depths the psalmist tells the sacred story of our human experience," he says. "We speak the ineffable holy language of grief and fear, hope and promise. It is a place of our most sacred and honest conversation with God."

Formerly known as "The Protestant Hour," "Day 1" has been broadcast every week for 64 years, winning numerous awards in the process, including the George Foster Peabody Award and the Communicators' Award for Excellence in inspirational radio. Distributed to more than 200 radio stations across America and overseas, it is produced by the Alliance for Christian Media in association with the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship, the Episcopal Church, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), the United Church of Christ and the United Methodist Church.

To become an MS-150 All Star, riders are asked to go to the website www.bikeMSatlanta.org and sign on as a member of the Epiphany All Stars Team. We have three members so far. What are you waiting for? Arlen Gray, John Keys and Dennis Edmiston know they will be joined by other riders. Last year in addition to team "captain" Arlen Gray, Tom Felcher and Bob Peatman rode, as did Diane Wilkey (who has since moved to Asheville, NC). Registration for the event is \$35 until July 31, \$50 until Sept 6, and \$300 Sept 7. The registration fee does not count toward the requested minimum \$250 in fund raising.

Of course, the MS Society hopes riders will go above and beyond the \$250 minimum. The Society is having a hard time gathering corporate support this year, and at the same time, the number of people diagnosed with MS continues to grow. We need riders, and we need financial support.

This ride will take place at Callaway Garden, with well-marked loops of varying distances each day. Arlen did the short loops both Saturday and Sunday and found it very comfortable. Tom and Bob enjoyed (?) the century loops.

If enough riders show interest, Arlen will reserve a cabin so that we may have a central meeting place to socialize before and after the rides. Six to eight riders will make this option practical. Callaway gives us a special rate for the event. One thing for sure, we always have a ball together on these rides.

This team is for riders of all abilities, and, with Arlen slowing down, she would appreciate having a beginner or middling pedaler (or two or three) to keep her company.

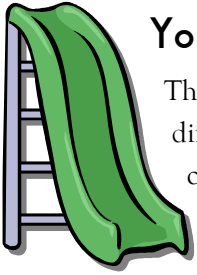

Godly Play Training

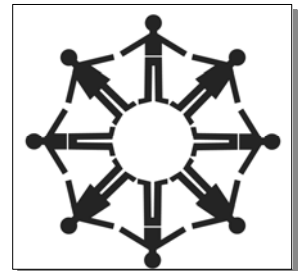
