Something Beautiful For God

I sit here at my dining room table staring at the paintings my mother has done. They are beautiful. One is of a tree lined road, aglow in gold and light. The other a swan coming to roost in its nest among the rushes, touching down in the early light of morning. I think of something beautiful for God.

I was talking to my mother the other day about theology, and morals and ethics, righteousness and judgment. Something we do often, conversations about high minded stuff that is. And I had made a statement about seeing God's righteousness in terms of beauty, what is right with the world God has made. We talked about not seeing a life with God as a list of proscriptive behavior, nor as a compulsory mandate about belief in a doctrine or ideology. We talked about the beauty of an end to poverty, and the beauty of a beginning of justice for the marginalized. We talked about the necessity of a right way of seeing how we go about our mundane human relationships from a vantage point of right seeing, which perhaps is to help others, help ourselves actualize a real sense of being liberated from what ever oppressive regimes, real or imagined we might find ourselves; how beautiful that would be.

In her typical self-effacing way, she said, where did you get this notion, where did these thoughts come from (she still struggles against her own fundamentalistic notions of God). And I laughed and said well, my mother is an artist! Took her just a second and she laughed to.

Something Beautiful for God is the title of a short biography of the life of Mother Teresa.

I don't remember much of the book (I read it in high school), but the title itself has commuted a sense of a different way to go about our life with God. The title implies a deeply incarnational experience of beauty, and of God. The title would suggest that not only was the work of this saint something beautiful for God, but she herself was. In all of what she experienced, in the freedom she sought in service to the poor and the marginalized, she found beauty-in the work, in the other, and in herself. She was something beautiful for God.

I find beauty all around me at Epiphany. Not just our gardens, and galleries, though those are potent symbols of our communal assent to beauty as a way to see God. I see it also in our outreach, in our worship, in all the toil and sweat that you all bring to making something beautiful for God.

Most often I find beauty in your stories of triumph and failure. I find beauty in your search for God, in your devotion to church, in your devotion to each other. It inspires me.

It is a struggle to wake every morning and consider that I might be something beautiful for God. To see my work, and play and the ups and downs of my life as something beautiful for God. But just maybe. Just maybe on my better days I catch a glimpse of the possibility that my life may just be such an endeavor. Its not easy. But it is glorious to consider.

I am glad to be in a place with such faithful beautiful people yearning, searching, working to be something beautiful for God.

Parish News

Financial Report to Parish

Janet Wilson, Treasurer, and Rick Timmer, Chair, Finance Committee

We remain concerned about the current financial situation for our parish. When we last reported in May, reported a net operating deficit of \$47,313. The current operating deficit stands at \$58,322. The reason for the current operating deficit is the significant gap between actual pledge income received versus the amount budgeted. As of August, our actual amount of pledge was off by about 15% (actual vs. budgeted). This is the largest variation in actual pledge income versus the budgeted amount that we have seen in the last 10 years. Based on historical data, we would anticipate being off at this point in the year about 7-8% (based on the average of data from 1999-2008). Expenses through the end of August were slightly over-budget (\$689).

An additional difficulty for the Vestry as we struggle with the current operating deficit is the timing on receipt of pledge income. Based on data over the last ten years, we know that we receive at least 25% of all pledge income in the last two months of the year. For the current year budget, if we received 25% of pledge income in the last two months it would be about \$125,000.

Normally your Vestry is comfortable with this pattern of pledge giving. However, this year is extraordinary in terms of the national economy and how that impacts all of us. The negative impact of the current economy is a likely factor in where current pledge income stands (15% off budget) compared to the average over the past 10 years (7-8% off budget).

We ask the parish at large to look at your quarterly giving statements that will be coming out shortly. If you have fallen behind in your pledge through oversight, we ask that you work to bring it current.

However, if your situation has changed, we ask that you prayerfully review this and, if needed, we ask that you contact Benno, Cynthia or Janet Wilson (Epiphany's treasurer) so we can know if your pledge

should be adjusted from your initial expectation. If you have pastoral concerns related to changes in your financial situation, please be in touch with Benno or Cynthia.

An update on your pledge situation, if you believe it has changed, can help the Vestry make the best possible decisions as we enter the last quarter of the year.

If you are not a current pledger, now would be a great time to consider making a pledge to Epiphany! The simple act of pledging, no matter the amount, offers you the opportunity to meditate on your blessings, to grow in faith, to see Christ's work of reconciliation in our broken world. For the rest of the year, we will be reporting monthly during the announcement period during services, in the weekly email distribution and in the Star. We thank one and all for your commitment to Epiphany of time, talent and treasure.

The paragraphs below are from Holy Comforter's website and give a little history of the parish.

Holy Comforter has been in Southeast Atlanta for over 100 years. In nearly every decade of that history, urban growth has changed the face of the neighborhoods around Holy Comforter, leading its members to ask again and again, "Who is my neighbor whom God is calling on me to love?"

In the mid 1980's, the answer was clear. By then, Holy Comforter was firmly situated in a neighborhood that had many personal care homes for persons with mental illnesses. And so the people of Holy Comforter did what came naturally to them: they simply reached out to their neighbors, many of whom lived in these personal care homes.

It is critical to understand that Holy Comforter does not run a program to help persons with mental illness; rather these people are the church gathered at Holy Comforter. These are the members of the Body of Christ who pray daily, who are fed by the Eucharist, who acolyte and serve, sing, run the altar guild, make pastoral care visits on Sunday, who bring their gifts for the service of everyone. These people, who are often alienated in society, are knit together by the love of Jesus Christ at Holy Comforter.

Said one member of Holy Comforter, "The people (with mental illnesses) at our parish now outnumber those of us called 'mainstream' by our culture. It didn't take us long to figure out what the Holy Spirit had in mind when he brought us together. We quickly realized that we needed them, that their ministry was to us. They have a great faith in God. They trust in Him for their very survival. To most of our culture, God is an option. God to them is ultimate. They have taught us all a new dynamic sense of faith."

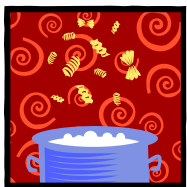

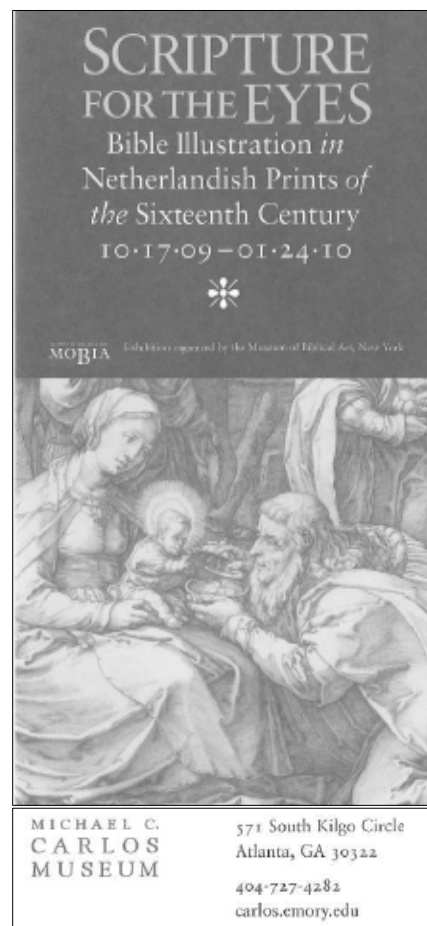
